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Letter from the Director

2024 has been another year of growth and learning for the Highland County District Library! We had lots of engaging events, contests, and programs designed to provide information, enrichment, and education to Highland County residents. Library activities ranged from the formation of a travel club, to a community scavenger hunt, to story times at local schools and Head Start classes, to visits from our favorite animal friends, marionettes, and even Santa! We are grateful to the many community partners and patrons who helped make these events possible. In other big news for 2024, the Leesburg Library received some needed repairs to the outside trim of the building and the Hillsboro Library received a new outdoor sign to help establish the library as an essential part of the Highland County community.

We were pleased to welcome several new staff additions this year, in our on-going efforts to provide high-quality public service. The following individuals joined the library in 2024: Barbara Funk and Robin Snyder – Rocky Fork Library; Kimber Cooper - Leesburg Library; Leslie Adams – Greenfield Library; and Aleah Sheppard and Kathrine Wilson - Hillsboro Library. We're excited to have them join our library crew! Finally, Greenfield Library legend Deb Wise retired after 30-plus years and Hillsboro Library legend Donna O'Dom retired after 20-plus years. Both were exemplary library workers and will be missed. We wish them the very best!

Patrons and librarians alike had lots of fun with the 2024 Summer Reading program, "Adventure Begins at Your Library". We held great activities such as princess visits, catapult and rocket building, science events, Old West adventures, an Alice in Wonderland party, a bear hunt, medieval and magical celebrations, and more. We also welcomed some scary birds of prey and cool critters. We teamed up again with the Humane Society for a successful pet adoption event. Multiple crafts, drawings, contests, and games were also available to child, teen, and adult library patrons throughout Summer Reading and everyone who participated had a great time!

Other popular regular events such as Paint Nights, Merry Money, Trunk-or-Treats, Comic-Con, and Luminaria (along with regular book, knitting, and chess clubs) continue to be a big hit. The Library once again joined with the African American Awareness Research Council and the Highland County Historical Society for a Black History program honoring the Coleman Family and Josh McCoy. We had craft and reading club activities for all ages throughout the year, and held special Halloween events and Christmas celebrations. In 2025, we want to add even more popular craft activities, clubs, and classes recommended by patrons.

The total annual circulation for 2024 was **299,953**. This number includes the circulation of e-format items (e-books and digital or downloadable audio and video items) which was **52,246** (an almost 7% increase from 2023!). The total annual circulation was approximately 1.2% lower than last year's circulation. On a positive note, the number of programs offered went up 8.4%! This data is an incentive for us to find new ways to improve the library's collection for Highland County residents. With that in mind, we opened a public survey asking what programs and materials the community would like to see. The results from this survey will guide what we offer library patrons in 2025, and will hopefully lead to further engagement and use by the Highland County community in the upcoming year. The library team has also taken a multi-pronged approach to increasing library usage in 2024, including circulation-based contests; attending more community events; increasing visits and communication to schools, pre-schools, and Head Start; posting on community Facebook pages; public surveys; emailed newsletters; teen-focused clubs; and more story-times. And in 2025, we plan to continue this by also offering video game nights, classes on library apps, partnering with community groups such as the Senior Center and YMCA, more reading clubs, classic move nights, book bundles, weeding the library collections, and providing pop-up libraries at community events.

2024 proved to be a good building year for the Highland County District Library. Our goal is to improve further and make the library an even better resource for the community in 2025!

HILLSBORO ADULT AND TEEN DEPARTMENTS

2024 was a busy year for programming at the Hillsboro Library. We offered several new clubs and activities, increased our outreach, and expanded our Summer Reading roster--and the community responded with enthusiasm!

In total, 1,204 kids, 189 teens, and 2,809 adults came to our programs throughout the year, for a total of: 4,202. In comparison, our total participation was 1,630. This is a 157.7% increase from last year.

New programs added to this year's schedule included: Two baking contests; Cookbook Club; Series Club; Youth Writing Club; and month-long celebrations, including Poetry Month and Roald Dahl month. Our baking contests (one focused on cookies and the other on holiday treats), were held in May and November respectively. We partnered with local bakers to act as judges and saw contestants and taste-testers of all ages come to compete and sample. In total, these contests saw 107 participants.

The Hillsboro Library also started four new ongoing clubs this year. The Series Club is focused on ages 9-15 (with parents/guardians encouraged to participate alongside them) as we all read our way through a selected series. By the end of 2024, 120 participants had read, snacked, and crafted their way through the first two *Harry Potter* books. Pokémon Club, headed by librarian Kim Norman, saw a total of 112 people come "catch 'em all" with special activities and snacks that celebrate these famous "pocket monsters." The club is designed for ages 8-14, but, again, parents/guardians are more than welcome to join in the fun.

Kim also organizes the Youth Writing Club, which has two very dedicated young patrons working on writing their own books. Kim also keeps busy with the Cookbook Club, during which adult patrons are invited to pick a recipe from an assigned cookbook, make it, and then share it during a monthly potluck. Youth Writing and Cookbook Club have both had a harder time gaining popularity; however, they still saw a total of 54 participants.

In addition to adding new activities to our programming schedule, we also focused on interacting with the community outside of the library. We attended meetings of the Women's Club, the Rotary Club, and the Garden Club. We also had

booths set up during a special farmer's market and at a community resource fair. We are grateful to the community for thinking of us with these events and we hope to continue to make similar connections next year. In total, we reached 209 people throughout the community.

Summer Reading is always the library's busiest month, and that was certainly true this year. We expanded our program, offering 15 activities in comparison to 8 in 2023. With the help of a grant, we were able to offer a variety of crafts, speakers, and interactive experiences. Highlights include the annual Comic Con and Local Author Night, as well as a presentation by Ohio Nature entitled "Animals We Love to Hate;" crafts, such as tie-dye and rock-painting; and an Amazing Race experience where patrons could "travel" the world and compete in challenges. Altogether, Summer Reading saw 1,304 patrons having fun at the library. In comparison to last year (349 participants), 2024's summer programming saw a 273% increase in participation.

Additionally, the library also continued with its established programming. This includes periodic drawings and contests (such as the Hobby Month and Valentine's Day drawings), passive programs (such as Poetry Month's weekly activities and the Seed Exchange), annual patron-favorites (such as the Altered Book Art Contest and the return of the library's murder mystery parties), special celebrations (such as Pokémon Week and Roald Dahl Month, both of which were in conjunction with the children's department); and regular monthly and bi-monthly clubs (including Craft-ernoons and Travel Club).

Our Craft-ernoons in particular continue to grow and see patrons of all ages come together to make unique creations. The Craft-ernoons are headed by librarians Avery Applegate, Vivian Barrowclough, and Sarah Davidson. This year, 308 patrons attended Craft-ernoons. (Participation for 2023 was 247.) Also continuing to grow in popularity is the Travel Club, which was first introduced in 2023. Children's manager Gabrielle Pitzer assists in this club, which this year saw 179 patrons, ages infant through retired.

Other regular clubs include: Trivia Tuesdays, Write-Away Club, BYO-Book Club, and Comic Book Club. These clubs, headed by Sarah, saw less participation in 2024, but the patrons who come are dedicated and enthusiastic. In total, 185 patrons attended these clubs throughout the year.

Continuing in its earnest popularity is the library's bi-monthly Paint Nights. Run by librarian Donna O'Dom until her retirement at the end of July, these classes are always in high-demand with a long waiting list. Following Donna's retirement, assistant manager Betty Yates inherited organizing the classes and patron Dottie Bayless took over teaching the lessons. The Paint Nights have continued to produce beautiful masterpieces and happy patrons, with 220 participating throughout the year.

Also this year, the library offered ASL (American Sign Language) classes. These were offered throughout the year with two different instructors, with variable participation. Some classes would see several students; others would only see one or two. We are evaluating to see if this is a program that we should continue in 2025. Throughout the year, 88 patrons attended classes.

We also began a patron-led Dungeons and Dragons campaign, which meets every other Saturday. Excitement and participation was overwhelming; at one time, 18 patrons were in attendance during one meeting. In all, from September through December, 82 patrons (ages tween through adult), participated in these epic fantasy adventures.

We are very grateful to everyone who donated throughout the year that allowed us to be able to offer such a wide variety and quantity of programs. These include: Long's Retreat, COSI, Young's Dairy, Rockin' Jump, Gibbs Insurance Association, Clark Family Dentistry, Dairy Queen, Hillsboro Family Dentistry, Merchant's National Bank, Dancing on Tabletops Studios, Hendrix Pottery, Just My Type Jewelry, Burwinkle Family Dentistry, Bickle Insurance, Roller Haven, Jennifer West, the Cincinnati Zoo, Kings Island, Dr. Lesia Langston-McKenna, and Little Caesar's. Additionally, we would like to thank those who donated their time for programs: Brittney Howard (ASL classes), Grandma's Ghost Chasers (Paranormal Research Presentation), John Willis (Hiking Presentation), and the Bigfoot Research Organization (Bigfoot Presentation).

As we look ahead to 2025, we are incredibly grateful to our community which has shown outstanding support throughout the year. Our goal is to provide a fun place for learning, creativity, and enrichment, and we are so happy that our patrons seem to be enjoying the programs we have offered. We are going to evaluate surveys that we have taken throughout the

year to hopefully continue to offer activities that engage the community, and to also grow our rosters to include new interests. As such, we will try to reach as many people as possible who may not already be using the library. We will look at different advertising avenues as well as other outreach opportunities. As the calendar flips to January, we are hopeful and excited for 2025. Thank you, again, to our wonderful community, and to the staff here at the library whose skills, creativity, and teamwork, make these programs possible. Thank you!

HILLSBORO CHILDREN'S DEPARTMENT

If the Hillsboro Children's Library had to pick a word to describe 2024, it would be "non-stop." We hit the ground running in January and didn't seem to take a break the rest of the year. We tried to pack in as many events and ideas into the calendar year as we could. In fact, we ran out of time to do a lot of our ideas and are planning on fitting them into the 2025 calendar if possible. The 2024 children's library staff consisted of Gabrielle Pitzer (manager), Madeline Crabtree, Jill Wyatt, and Jamie Knedler.

Storytime once again proved to be one of, if not the most, popular program held at the library. The storytime groups had gotten so crowded in the last year, that we decided to add two additional sessions on Mondays. The Monday and Wednesday sessions all read the same book and did the same craft to give parents more opportunities to attend based on their personal schedules each week. Monday sessions were at 10:30 and 11:00 am and Wednesday sessions were at 11:00 and 11:30 am. Over the course of the year, storytime was held 129 times with 1,461 children and 1,006 adults attending. Hopefully storytime will continue to be as popular as ever in the coming year.

Our outreach efforts with local schools also grew this year. As with the 2023 school year, Jill made monthly visits to read to the children that attend the YMCA's Patri-Tot program at Southern State Community College. Jill was also asked to come read to the children at Sunrise Sunset Day Care each month. The two groups were visited 8 times with 166 children and 129 adults attending. The Hillsboro Christian Academy asked to continue to visit the library twice a month to check out books for the 2024 school year. For this school year there were two classes instead of just one. The end of the last school year and beginning of the next saw 269 children and 39 adult visits. Before summer reading, Gabrielle visited and talked about the program to the entire elementary school at Bright Local and the 20 kindergarten and first grade classes at Hillsboro Elementary.

We were also able to conduct outreach with several other school and community events. The preschoolers from Hills and Dales came to the library for a field trip in the early spring. Information tables were set up at the Highland County Community Fair, the Highland County Community Baby Shower, and the Hillsboro Elementary Open House. We attended and spoke at meetings for the local Rotary Club and the Hillsboro Women's Club. And several times throughout the year, patrons made cards that were shared with local nursing homes, community helpers (police, sheriff's, and fire departments), and the local Veterans Office.

We are proud to say that the attendance for Lego Club nearly doubled from last year. The club meet a total of 22 times with 179 children and 162 adults attending. For each meeting, Jamie had a theme or challenge for the children at build upon. As always, the children love showing off their creations in our display case after each meeting.

"Adventure Begins at Your Library" really rang true for our summer reading program. It really was our busiest summer reading in recent years. After listening to feedback from patrons, we once again changed our reading goals to be the same for children of all ages (50 books), but changed our prize system (the children earned "Brag Tags" when goals were met). 352 children ages 0-14 signed up for the program and 106 of them completed the goal of 50 books. In addition to our normal Thursday evening programs, we added what we called Crafty Tuesdays Mornings, which proved to be extremely

popular. In total, there were 15 summer reading programs held in June and July with just over 1,300 children, teens, and adults taking part.

The numbers for the Imagination Library of Ohio saw growth both state and county wide. Statewide enrollment went from 59% to 62%. And 62% of eligible children in Highland County are enrolled. The library's 1,000 Books Before Kindergarten program saw a couple more children finish and several more sign-up. The children and their parents have been reading a lot over the past year and we believe that 2025 will have our largest number of finishers.

In 2024 the state library system asked us to track the number of scavenger hunts done and take home crafts given to patrons. The children love scavenger hunts, so we tried to have them monthly this year. We made up 14 different hunts throughout the year and they were done just over 1,000 times! Last year we had started our Take Home Craft program and really expanded on the idea. In addition to coming up with one or two crafts per month, we started offering any extra crafts we had left over from storytime. Patrons had their choice of 36 different crafts over the year and 1,049 were given away. Other than summer reading programs, our most popular program had to be our Alice in Wonderland Tea Party. Over 100 patrons attended and Papa John's was generous enough to donate pizza for the event. Our most popular give away event was for the Solar Eclipse glasses. Not a pair was to be had the day of the eclipse.

We really hope that we can repeat the success of this year in 2025. We have lots of ideas and are really looking forward to the "Color Your World" summer reading program.

The Summer Reading Program brought many children, teens, and adults to the library throughout June and July. "Adventure Begins at your Library" took us brought animals, messes, and fun to the library. The Greater Herpetological Society of Cincinnati returned with their ever-popular "Reptiles" which brought in over 180 patrons- of course, if was the day our air conditioning went out. We had Dr. Tony impress us with his balancing and magic tricks. We were lucky to have Middle School students from the McClain FFA bring in some of their farm animals. The library also welcomed a Scottish Princess and These guest programs along with our Tie-Dye, Slime, Play Dough, and Perler Bead programs brought hundreds of people to the library during Summer Reading.

We had several other events at the library. The Halloween Party and Gingerbread Candy Christmas Event were very successful and fun. We look forward to what the new year brings us.

LEESBURG BRANCH LIBRARY

The Leesburg Branch Library in 2024 continued to be the place for everyone in the community to gather and connect. We remained a source of help in a time where community services are being reduced and eliminated. We were recognized by Leesburg's Mayor, Rita Smith-Daulton, for our efforts to assist patrons with their informational, educational and recreational needs. We are proud to be an integral part of the Leesburg community. We are still providing curbside service upon request and our Hot Spots are continuously checked out or waiting to be pick up.

We provided nearly 300 programs/events/activities for our patrons throughout 2024. Participation in our children's programming continues strong. In addition to our twice weekly in library Story Time, we provide a monthly Story Time to the Fairfield preschool classes and Kindergarten through Second Grade at Fairfield Elementary. Monday evening Lego Club and Saturday morning Lego Club are still drawing in both youth and families. Crafts and trivia remain popular!

Our relationship with Fairfield Elementary School continues to strengthen and grow. In addition to Story Time, we participated in Lion on Learning in March, had a week long outreach in May promoting our summer reading program and gave candy to the Fairfield's Safe Trick or Treat Give-A-Way in October while continuing our own Beggar's Night tradition.

Our summer reading program, *Adventure Begins at Your Library*, was a hit. 214 Youth (11 & younger), 61 Teens (12-18) and 53 Adults (19 & older) signed up. Youth participation was up over 30%, while teen and adult participation more than doubled over 2023. We had visits from Cool Critter Outreach, Professor Tony, Stephanie Ortlieb & Lola, Stevens Puppets, Crystal Clear Science and Gnu Adventure. Our Pokémon Event was one of the patron favorites.

Our fall gratitude challenge saw our patrons express thanks for everything from chickens to family to faith to the library and books and more. RRR, our adult reading group, is sadly and reluctantly considering disbanding. However, another group has been started by a new group of readers. This year's Leesburg Luminaria was well attended at the library for the crowning of the King and Queen.

We have always enjoyed working with local organizations to provide services to our community. In 2024 we were able to work with and/or supported the Leesburg Fire Dept. and Life Squad, Leesburg Food Bank, Community Action, the Leesburg Lions Club, the Leesburg Historical Society, Fairfield Elementary School and Fairfield Preschool.

LYNCHBURG BRANCH LIBRARY

We are proud to say that the Lynchburg Branch continues to play a vital role in the village and in the communities surrounding Lynchburg. Local agencies such as Highland County Community Action and the Clinton County Board of Developmental Disabilities used our meeting room for appointments with clients. Buckeye Online Testing met with 25 clients at the library in 2024 as well. Online contests and polls are extremely popular in our community. Brian Vance of

the Lynchburg Masonic Lodge challenged us to run a poll: Are people from Lynchburg called *Lynchburgers* or *Lynchburgians*? There were 197 votes across three community pages, with most preferring the name *Lynchburgians*. For our Jelly Bean contest, we had 30 in-person entries and 453 online entries!

We enjoyed a strong relationship with Lynchburg-Clay Elementary School again this year. The weekly Kindergarten story times resulted in 1,659 interactions with kids and teachers over the school year. We made 57 new library cards for kindergarteners in September for Library Card Signup Month. Two classes had 100% participation in signups and got library pizza parties for their students. We are very fortunate that our four kindergarten teachers promote the public library and encourage kids and their parents to use it. In March, combination Youth Librarian (since 1997) & Branch Manager (since 1999) Elaine Williams was nominated by the Lynchburg-Clay kindergarten teachers as a Community Service Award Recipient by the Southern Ohio Educational Service Center. She and her guest Danica Bailey attended the recognition ceremony for Elaine to accept this award at the Four-County School Boards meeting, held at the Laurel Oaks Campus on May 9.

In addition to our usual, traditional programming, we made an extra effort in 2024 to hop on the bandwagon of popular culture to reach more of a built-in audience, with good results. The newest Indiana Jones movie inspired our 2024 Jungle Adventure summer reading event. For Harry Potter fans, we offered *An Evening at Hogwarts* in January and the Harry Potter Birthday Party in July. For sports fans, there was a Super Bowl Touchdown Challenge and a drawing for tickets to a Cincinnati Cyclones hockey game. Squishmallow Bingo had the activity room at capacity twice during the year, and we have already had a request to do it again in 2025. The total solar eclipse in April captured everyone's imagination; for this event, we distributed hundreds of eclipse glasses, made special displays, and hosted the Cincinnati Observatory's Eclipse presentation for all ages. After a short hiatus and leadership change, our Dungeons & Dragons group is underway again using a free starter adventure kit distributed to libraries by the makers of the game.

As always, the Summer Reading Club is the highlight of our year. The theme was *Adventure Begins at Your Library*, and we tried to live up to that slogan with programming that included science, sharks and other creatures, character performances, and art. We tried a unique program this year called "Traveling You" that involved local children and their parents creating a mini-me paper version of themselves, which the library then mailed to 14 participants across the country. In paper form, these traveled all over the USA: everywhere from the beaches of North Carolina to the mountains of Vancouver, Washington, from Chicago to Waxahachie, Texas. The recipients of the "flat kids" all photographed them on various adventures and emailed the pictures back to the library. Each child received color photos of their alter egos at touristy locations and a map highlighting where they had been. Everyone seemed to enjoy the Traveling You project! Our Merry Money program in the fall involved 97 readers, shoppers, volunteers, and family members.

Lynchburg's Top Adult Library User of the Year was Mr. James Braley, who lives a block away from us and walked down to check out a whopping 572 items in 2024 – this does not include renewals! When informed of his top position, Mr. Braley was very pleased and said, "The library is what I do!" In 2025, we are looking forward to serving him and all of the other individuals and families who have made the public library what they do, and we are grateful for the ongoing and essential support of the library board and administration. Thank you so much!

ROCKY FORK BRANCH LIBRARY

The Rocky Fork Branch began 2024 finishing out our winter reading challenge. We had 18 kids, 2 teens, and 3 adults signed up. In January going into February we had a display on the front desk where patrons shared the reasons why they love their library with answers that ranged from loving story time, to being thankful for the kind, helpful staff. In March we had the joy of handing out glasses to prepare for the eclipse. Patrons who checked out 3 adult items, or 5 kids' items received a pair of glasses. We gave a total of 140 glasses. In April we were overrun with 5th and 6th grade students from

the Hillsboro Christian academy. We learned about the origin of Earth Day and went over the basics of how the library works.

In May we worked hard preparing for our Summer Reading Program. June and July saw the fruition of our efforts. We had 36 kids and 15 adults sign up for summer reading. Every week we had a new adventure for story time, complete with different decorations and a new scavenger hunt to match the adventure of the week. We also had several guest speakers come to visit including Illusionist Jake Lindsey, Crystal Clear Science, Ohio Nature Education, and Ohio Department of Natural Resources officer. We also did our best to get the Rocky Fork business community involved with our community scavenger hunt. We had a total of 8 people participate and they all commented on how much fun they had.

In September we celebrated Smokey Bear's 80th birthday by participating in the Smokey Bear Reading challenge. We had 13 kids sign up to learn more about how to prevent forest fires.

In October we got to participate in two trunk or treats, one at the Dollar General next door and one at the Hillsboro Church of the Nazarene. We decorated our trunk with a Charlotte's Webb theme and got to pass out treats with information about our story times and Lego club to 158 kids at Dollar General and 541 kids at the Nazarene church.

In November we were happy to celebrate our 5-year anniversary. We did this by giving away five, \$50 gift cards. To be put into the drawing, patrons had to check out 5 items. We had 79 entries. We also held our first adult craft night where we made floral center pieces in preparation of Thanksgiving. In December we ended the year with another adult craft where we made Christmas wreaths. It was such a hit that patrons were asking when the next craft will be, so in 2025 we will be adding a monthly adult craft time. We also had a fun visit from Santa Clause and had a total of 33 people come to see him. We read a Christmas story and handed out small stuffed animal key chains.

We also had a few staff changed this year. Sam Planck left us after almost three years and was replaced by Barbara Funk. In September Elisabeth Greer left to get married. She was replaced by Robin Snyder. We miss Sam and Elisabeth, but are happy to have Barbara and Robin.

Looking ahead to 2025, we are looking forward to finding ways to grow our recurring programs like story time and Lego club while adding new programs like our adult craft time. We are also looking forward to the fun art theme for summer reading this year.
